In a quest to engage an audience productively, speakers and writers require a reasonable amount of words that defines their intentions, convey their desires and expresses their expectations in the message been shared. The inability of the communicator to use sufficient quantity of words to pass a meaning across to an audience can be the difference between a response to act on his message and an immediate applause for the cause for which the speaker has advanced.



IMPORTANCE OF RIGHT WORDS

It is not enough to also possess a rich depth of words that you can draw from to convey your message, it is also important that these words are appropriate for the message you desire to convey. Whenever one uses a word that is inappropriate to convey a message, one risks confusing the audience and getting to the point where intended meaning is different from perceived meaning.

The words written or spoken to other people always leave them with an impression. Our words create experiences that people store in their memory. The words we choose in our interactions and conversations can build relationships or mar them depending on the value and virtue in those words. It therefore becomes very important to be equipped in expressing oneself with right set of words. Prime attention is to be given to ones choice of words and the manner in which they are transmitted to other people.

Right words are important for the following reasons:

The Effect of Connotation. When we speak or write, we want to be sure
that our intended meaning is perceived as such. Words can belittle, justify,
compliment and change people and situations in more than one way. One
has to be wary of words that carry ideas of other meanings in addition to
the original meanings.

"Be mindful when it comes to your words. A string of some that don't mean much to you, may stick with someone else for a lifetime." - Rachel Wolchin



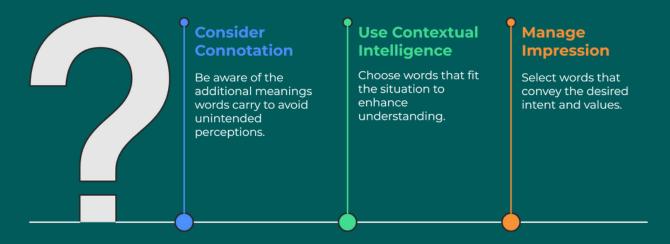
• The Need for Contextual Intelligence: Our words can encourage, persuade, inform, and do much more. However in its expression we must consider the context before choosing which word carries the most appropriate meaning. We choose words depending on the circumstances surrounding the conveyor per time. Contextualizing words also helps in deepening understanding of the recipients of the message. Effective communicators must possess that ability to engage their knowledge of the context in choosing the appropriate words.

• The Force of Impression: Words are bearers of intent and purpose at all times. It becomes important for the user of words to give attention to the feelings and ideas that those words transmit to others. When words are received, without much conscious assessment of what is said, impressions are formed about the speaker or author and the values s/he bears. The way people react to a message defines what impressions the words they heard have had on them.

6 WAYS TO OVERCOME THE PAUCITY OF WORDS

In this post, I have identified 6 ways to overcoming the paucity of words in expressing your intention to others. These 6 ways are not an exhaustive list of how to improve your reservoir of words rather they are vital keys that can be used to boost your usage of words whether in writing or speaking to an audience.

- USE OTHER PEOPLES WORDS: Those who are observant and attentive will be able to pick words from conversations and interactions. One way to overcome the poverty of words is to use words spoken by other people in your own speeches or writings. In doing this, you leverage on their quality to enhance your communication. When using other peoples words, you must ensure to cite them as the authority. As often as you do this, you will begin to stimulate your mind to say or write words fluently and with greater proficiency.
- CREATE YOUR OWN WORDS: Orison Marden in his book "Hints for Young Writers" said of Rudyard Kipling, "When Kipling does not find a word just suited to his meaning, he invents one, usually so expressive that it becomes a permanent addition to our language." I have come to accept that the lack of something always leads to creation of what is needed. Necessity they say is the mother of invention. The invention of words is based on the need to deepen the expression of intent. Words are by no means sufficient to express intention. However, without them, understanding of a message is grossly underrepresented.
- BORROW WORDS FROM OTHER CONTEXTS: There are words that belong to other professions, vocations and contexts besides yours but have the capacity to drive home your point to your audience. It does make sense to leverage on these words to convey your message to your audience particularly if they have prior knowledge and understanding of the borrowed words. For example, the word "dissect" may have originally been used in biology or anatomy but a statistician can now use it to mean "analyse".



- **EXPLORE SIMILAR WORDS:** Whenever a speaker or writer is short of appropriate words to use, he may consider other words or phrases that have similar meanings to what he intends to express. A typical example of this is "request" being a synonym for "inquire" Another way is to look at other languages and attempt a transliteration of similar meanings to the one you seek to communicate.
- **REVERSE WORDS:** Inspiration for a right word can be derived when we seek a word opposite in meaning to the one you intended to use. Rather than use the word "hot" to express enthusiasm of an individual, you can say "I received a cold welcome from ..." Language is complex and thus this may be a simple way to let the receivers of your message interpret the words used by themselves without losing the essence of your meaning.
- PLAY WORD GAMES: I have learnt more words since I began to play games like WordaLot from Mag Interactive. Word games help you to improve your vocabulary and the volume of words you know. These games can be very addictive but once you get a grip of the games, you will notice improvements.
